Who We Help

We help all who need it, putting their dignity at the heart of everything we do. Personal challenges can happen to anyone, regardless of lifestage, health, faith, ethnicity or socio-economic status. Challenges can be small or large and be caused by one major event or an accumulation of smaller issues over time.

An event or situation that may be easily resolved by one individual could result in a major crisis for another. What matters most is how the event impacts that person's emotional, mental, spiritual and physical wellbeing, as well as the type and level of support they require.

A challenge can develop into a crisis when the person cannot cope with the event or situation using usual coping mechanisms and/or the support they've received so far.

A person in crisis can experience extreme emotional, physical, spiritual and mental stress which may result in negative life circumstances, behaviors and experiences.

We commonly help people experiencing:

No Interest Loan Scheme (NILS)

We now are able to facilitate a fair and affordable credit option through Good Shepherd Australia, providing loans of up to \$2,000 for essential purchases such as household items, car repairs and registration, medical expenses, technology, and education.



Jewish House & MyBond Financial Support

We have partnered with the dedicated team at MyBond to tackle homelessness and support survivors of Domestic and Family Violence. Together, we provide individuals in need with access to funds for rental bonds, alleviating their financial burden. Jewish House's Crisis Reduction Model

Our Crisis Reduction Model, developed over 40 years in partnership with clients, carers, and collaborators, aims to reduce the frequency and severity of crisis events. It is built around two complementary models – our Emergency Room Response Model and our Resilience Building Model.

Emergency Room Inspired Response Model

Like an emergency room, our team is always on standby, ready 24/7 to jump into action the moment a crisis hits.

Rapid Response:

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At the first sign of crisis, we mobilize quickly, with an all-hands-on-deck approach to reduce its impact.

Personal Connection:

We immediately engage with the individual, establishing a personal connection and assessing their specific needs.

Tailored Support:

We connect them to the right services and resources, providing customized care designed around their unique situation.

Long-Term Stability: Beyond the crisis, we stay involved with post-crisis care and trusted referrals, ensuring they have ongoing support for lasting recovery.

The demand for assistance is greater than ever and we remain committed to providing effective and holistic services to our clients. 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Fashion Forward

Fashion Forward transforms lives by raising vital funds for women and children, promoting sustainability through reselling donated clothing items, and saving thousands of pieces from landfill.

Fashion Forward continues to make a remarkable impact, surpassing its financial goal by raising \$200,444 this year, just over the \$200,000 target. Since its launch in 2020, this initiative has raised \$572,572 in support of Jewish House's essential crisis services for women and children. Co-founder Nicole Katz shared, "What started as a small project has now given me a sense of purpose and a community initiative I'm proud of." The initiative, which began on a small scale, has grown into a significant community-driven project. This year, Fashion Forward moved locations twice and continued to thrive despite the challenges.

The success of Fashion Forward lies in its simple yet powerful model: offering pre-loved designer clothing at affordable prices, with all proceeds supporting Jewish House. Donations continue to pour in from individuals, retailers, and consignment stores alike.

The Bondi Beach store is open three days a week —Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Sundays from 12:30 to 3:30 PM—making it a hub for fashion lovers and community supporters alike.

Fashion Forward also maintains a strong online presence, with customers shopping via Instagram (@fashionforwardreloved) and having items shipped directly to their door. As they look to the future, the Fashion Forward team remains dedicated to their mission of supporting Jewish House's crisis services and promoting sustainable fashion—one pre-loved piece at a time.

2024 Community Engagement and Events







Jewish House closed out 2023 on a festive note, bringing the community together through a series of joyful Chanukah events.

From the bustling celebration at Westfield Bondi Junction, featuring magic shows and balloon artists, to the vibrant gathering at Taronga Zoo with JNF and Maccabi, hundreds of families came together to share in the festivities.

As 2024 began, Jewish House continued to build on this momentum, engaging the community in meaningful and festive ways. In March, Purim celebrations included distributing over a thousand mishloach manot packages to schools, nursing homes, and supporters, with volunteers baking hamantaschen at the Big Kitchen in Bondi, creating a real sense of togetherness.

April's Golf Day at the New South Wales Golf Club was a great success, with 110 golfers joining for a day of friendly competition, auctions, and raffles. The Pesach food drive mobilised support from schools and shuls, resulting in many generous contributions. In May, Yom Ha'atzmaut saw a lively celebration at Randwick Racecourse with over 4,000 attendees, as Jewish House promoted JH Kids through interactive activities. The business lunch at PWC's Sydney offices also drew in a crowd, with guest speaker Anthony Dickman from the Reserve Bank offering valuable insights.

June's Push-Up Challenge was a fun, energetic event on the grass outside Woollahra Council, where staff came together for some friendly team-building.

Looking ahead, Jewish House is eagerly preparing for its upcoming Gala Event in November, ensuring that the sense of community and support continues to flourish throughout the year.

In their later years, they grew close to Jewish House, deeply valuing its essential community work. Both chose to leave a bequest to Jewish House as an expression of their gratitude, as well as a recognition of the worthy causes that were on display at the always busy Flood St headquarters. John's gift funded "The Shop" at Jewish House, providing essential supplies for those in need, which Linda proudly attended at its opening in 2017. Plaques now honor John and Linda's memory at Jewish House, and their family takes comfort in knowing that their legacy continues to uplift and serve the community they so cherished.

Treasurer Update

Jewish House remains profoundly grateful to our incredible donors and government partners, whose unwavering support continues to fuel our mission. Thanks to their generosity, we've been able to extend our reach and deepen the impact of our programs and services.

In FY24, our revenue grew from \$5.9 million to \$6.8 million—an impressive 14% increase. This was largely driven by a 35% rise in temporary accommodation income, reflecting the growing demand as rental and housing challenges intensify. However, we also faced setbacks, with donations, fundraising, and grants falling by 9%, impacted by global conflicts and economic uncertainty.


On a positive note, our commitment to expanding services is evident in a 30% increase in program and service expenses. Our dedicated team has worked tirelessly to meet the growing needs, particularly in temporary accommodation, NDIS, and psychological services, ensuring that we continue to make a real difference in the lives of those we serve.

In FY24, we faced rising accommodation costs, particularly in the Eastern suburbs, and we expect these challenges to persist into FY25. Despite this, Jewish House remains in a strong financial position.

FY25 marks a critical year for us. We are eager to begin the longawaited renovation and expansion of our Bondi premises, ensuring we can continue to meet the growing needs of people in crisis. With the steadfast support of our incredible community, we are confident we can achieve these ambitious goals.

Our heartfelt thanks go to Boroughs, whose continued dedication and expertise have been invaluable to Jewish House. We couldn't do this without them or without all of you.
